

International Day of Pink evolved from Pink Shirt Day as a more focused initiative specifically addressing LGBTQ+ bullying and discrimination. Here's how the evolution occurred:

1. Pink Shirt Day originated in 2007 when two high school students in Nova Scotia, Canada, David Shepherd and Travis Price, organized a campaign to wear pink shirts in support of a classmate who was bullied for wearing pink<sup>14</sup>.
2. This initial act of solidarity inspired youth at Jer's Vision (now Canadian Centre for Gender and Sexual Diversity) to establish the International Day of Pink<sup>2</sup>.
3. While Pink Shirt Day focuses on anti-bullying efforts in general, International Day of Pink was created with a specific aim to combat homophobia, transphobia, and LGBTQ+ discrimination<sup>12</sup>.
4. International Day of Pink expanded the scope of the original event, making it a global initiative rather than primarily a Canadian observance<sup>25</sup>.
5. The date for International Day of Pink was set for the second Wednesday of April, distinguishing it from Pink Shirt Day, which is observed on the last Wednesday of February in Canada<sup>14</sup>.
6. International Day of Pink has grown to include millions of participants worldwide, with over 8 million people taking part in 2012<sup>2</sup>.

This evolution demonstrates how a localized anti-bullying initiative transformed into a global movement with a specific focus on LGBTQ+ issues, while still maintaining the core message of solidarity against bullying.

While both Pink Shirt Day (last Wednesday of February) and International Day of Pink (second Wednesday of April) aim to combat bullying, International Day of Pink specifically focuses on anti-LGBTQ+ bullying and discrimination, while Pink Shirt Day has a broader anti-bullying scope.

Here's a more detailed breakdown:

## **Pink Shirt Day**

- **Focus:** Anti-bullying in general, aiming to promote kindness and inclusivity.
- **Origin:** Started in Nova Scotia in 2007 when two students organized to wear pink shirts after a classmate was bullied for wearing one.
- **Date:** Last Wednesday of February.

- **2025 Date:** February 26.
- **Activities:** Wearing pink shirts, participating in anti-bullying events, and raising awareness about bullying.

## International Day of Pink

- **Focus:** Specifically addresses anti-LGBTQ+ bullying and discrimination.
- **Origin:** Inspired by the same incident that led to Pink Shirt Day, with a goal to support LGBTQ+ individuals.
- **Date:** Second Wednesday of April.
- **2025 Date:** April 9.
- **Activities:** Wearing pink shirts, participating in events, and raising awareness about LGBTQ+ issues and bullying.
- This initiative inspired some youth at [Jer's Vision](#) (now Canadian Centre for Gender and Sexual Diversity), who thereby founded International Day of Pink, an effort to support their peers internationally with resources and ways to make their schools safer.
